Football, by the numbers

Coaches consider value of analytics

Analytics. It's a topic that draws responses from all ends of the spectrum.

To certain football minds, it's something that should be left at the tables in Las Vegas. Do I hit on 16 or pray that the dealer busts?

To others, it's about playing the odds. Can you demoralize the opposing team by recovering an onside kick? Is it ever worth kicking field goals or extra points?

What about punting? The rules give you four downs to gain 10 yards. If a coach takes punting out of the equation and uses all four of those downs, maybe instead of throwing the ball beyond the sticks on third-and-long, the offense runs a different play that has the upside for a big gain but at worst, sets up a fourth-and-short.

On the other side of the ball, it could just be about studying the opponent's tendencies. What kinds of plays do they lean on in certain situations?

Some area teams, such as Columbus Grove, give a headset to a statistician. Other teams, like Celina, have one person on the payroll dedicated solely to analytics.

A common theme among area coaches interviewed was game flow.

Even the ones who embrace the data to the highest degree conceded that sometimes it's not about the numbers, it's about how their team is playing that night and what the situation presents.

"Defensively it's something we use all the time," said Keith Recker, Van Wert's head coach. "We gameplan throughout the week, and we're getting information from the press box on Friday night about what other teams like to do in specific situations. Our calls go off of that, and we track things during the game to see if teams are following their usual tendencies."

The in-game replay system teams use on Hudl has not only been useful for watching opponents but for also scouting themselves.

"It's been valuable to us in terms of self-scouting, not trying to create tendencies," said Travis Moyer, Wapakoneta's head coach. "At the end of the day, I'm still a believer in putting the ball in the hands of your best players, no matter what. It's more about personnel in the situation and relying on the feel of the game."

Frank Russell, of Bath,

shared the same sentiment. No matter what the numbers say, both teams want to be aggressive, determine their own fates and not leave the outcome in anyone else's hands.

"We're going to be very aggressive because that's who we are as a team and who I am as a coach," Russell said. "The score and game clock can also dictate that decision, but more times than not, we're going to be on the aggressive side of things."

For Andy Schafer, at Columbus Grove, it's about having the right personnel, not just on the field but also up in the booth.

Ned Stechschulte is Grove's team statistician. He created a system in Microsoft Excel that provides Schafer with any number, anytime he wants it.

Stechschulte, who hasn't missed a game in years, relays the information in-game over a headset directly to the coaching staff. Schafer credits Stechschulte, saying his dedication to the program is the main reason they have access to numbers that help them in real-time.

"No. 1, there's not a lot of systems out there that do it during the game. No. 2, how do you get somebody who cares about your

High-flying Spartans looking for TCAL repeat

LIMA — When Bill Lawrence was named Lima Senior's head coach in April 2023, he promised the Spartans would be the greatest show on turt.

Fast forward one year later, and Lawrence has backed up that statement.

Lima Senior now has a pass-dominant offense that gets up the field in a hurry. The Spartans use all four downs to get 10 yards if needed, and when the Spartans score, they

go for two. As a team, they take risks,

and they play the odds. That mentality paid off by turning what was a three-win team in 2022 into a 9-3 playoff team that went 6-0 in their first year in the Toledo Citv Athletic League.

It was just the fifth time in the last 23 seasons that Lima Senior finished with a winning record.

Lawrence called his first season at the helm a whirlwind, but he's confident the Spartans can take another step forward this season.

"Everything is happening around you so fast during that first year," he said. "We're installing a new offense and defense, getting all of our systems in place and figuring out how you want to practice.

"Coming into this season, all of that is established, so now that the kids know these things and why we do them. We're just trying to get better every day in our system. I can breathe a lot easier now that it's year two."

Lawrence also has the luxury of bringing back his junior quarterback, Ja'Niaus Hall, the 2023 Toledo City Athletic League and a selection to The Lima News Dream Team.

Hall put up staggering numbers in Lima Senior's new quarterback-centric offense, finishing his sophomore year with 255 completions for 3,932 yards and 46 touchdowns in 12 games.

Lawrence says his signal-caller added a few inches in height, along with around 15 pounds of muscle after a dedicated offseason in the weight room.

Gaining strength has been a main point of emphasis for the Spartans. In June, an average of 60 kids showed up to morning weight-lifting sessions, and that number stayed consistently above 50 all summer.

"After last year, we knew we had to get stronger," Lawrence said. "Our team had record numbers in the weight room. I'm very excited and proud of them for that.

"Nutrition has also been a big focus for us. If we want to make a deep run, we need to know how to take care of our bodies.'

Despite losing four wide receivers, Hall is still surrounded by plenty of talent on offense.

On the offensive line, the Spartans bring back three starters. Players in the mix there include seniors Curtis Pollard (6-1, 282), Harley Klett (5-8, 260), Alex Waithe (5-11, 235) and Jon Tummel (6-0, 260), among others.

In an effort to replace the production of graduated seniors, the Spartans will employ a deep group at wide receiver that includes four returning lettermen in Kahliq Wash, Isaiah Wilson, Kevon Smith and Jaelen Webster.

Wash registered around 500 receiving yards as a junior, Wilson currently holds Division I college offers, and Smith, a big 6-3 target with reliable hands, slides over from the defensive side of the ball.

Amari Addy, Vontae Watkins-Daniel and Amontrae Davis will also see time out wide.

Lawrence called Davis, a freshman, a special player after he had a great offseason, and he's excited about the prospect of adding Watkins-Daniel, who hasn't played football since his freshman year due to injury and eligibility issues.

"He's a talented young man," Lawrence said of Watkins-Daniel. "He's older now and more mature. He's shown a lot of passion and desire to play. We're very proud of him for that."

On defense, the Spartans have linebackers Tavion James (the leading tackler in 2023) and Cam-Ron Nicks back as two of seven returning starters.

Even with a heavy focus on offense, Lawrence said that the defense is something his team will need to lean on, especially in the early part of the season.

"Coach Tristan Reichelderfer (defensive coordinator) and the scheme that we run likes to cause a lot of havoc," Lawrence said. "Everyone talks about offense, but we're probably going to have to rely on them. We believe that if we want to go back-to-back, we've got to have a stout, physical, tough and hard-nosed defense."

Winning back-to-back TCAL championships is a goal for the Spartans, but their conference opponents might have other ideas. Both Start and Bowsher return important pieces, and Rahsan Wilson took over as coach at Rogers after leading Scott, his alma mater, to a resurgence.

"We have to be ready each week. We can't overlook anyone," Lawrence said. "Last year we came in as the new kid on the block in our conference, and they're not necessarily in love with us being in the Toledo League.

"For us to win it in year one and go undefeated, that puts us on everyone's radar now. These teams are going to be better against us. They've watched film all year watching what we do. The biggest thing is to not be over-confident and keep improving.'

Last year the Spartans started 1-2 and were outscored 116-42 in those games. After that, they ripped off eight straight victories, including a conference-clinching 26-14 win over Start on Oct. 20.

The Spartans open the season on Friday, Aug. 23 at home against Piqua. Their first conference game is on Sept. 20 against Bowsher at Spartan Stadium.

Experienced LCC finds league home in NWC

LIMA — With returning starters at 18 positions from a team that went 8-4 last season, Lima Central Catholic is optimistic about what this season could bring.

Last year 24 of the 36 players on the Thunderbirds' roster were freshmen and sophomores and there were only two seniors in the starting lineup.

That kind of math often doesn't add up to a highly successful season but LCC pulled that off to earn its seventh consecutive trip to the playoffs with a combination of young players and the two seniors - quarterback Carson Parker and receiver Billy Bourk leading the way on the field and in the locker room.

Replacing Parker and Bourk and getting more consistency overall will be two big factors in determining how successful the Thunderbirds are this season.

Parker, who threw for 2,178 yards and 23 touchdowns and rushed for 1,100 yards and 22 touchdowns, was second-team All-Ohio. Bourk (37 catches, 927 yards, 9 TDs) was an All-Ohio honorable mention. Both also started on defense.

"Replacing Carson is going to be tough. Billy is a big loss, too," LCC coach Scott Palte said.

"Those two did a lot. They were two really meaningful dudes. That's a lot of production and a lot of leadership and skill to replace," he said.

The search for a starting quarterback didn't take long. Parker's brother Brady, a sophomore, will take over that job.

"Brady has done a good job. He's a good athlete. Obviously, he's not as physical a player as Carson was

but he's got a good arm. He can throw the ball. His role will be different than Carson's but he's a good athlete," Palte said.

Running back Matthew Quatman will be "the main cog in our offense," Palte said. As a junior last season, Quatman was third-team All-Ohio when he rushed for 570 yards, caught five touchdown passes, was a starting defensive back and was LCC's kicker.

Linebacker Caden Falke also was third-team All-Ohio and two-way tackle Gianni McKee and defensive back Josh Young were honorable mention

All-Northwest Ohio. Five of LCC's returning

starters are two-way starters: Louis Knotts at defensive line and offensive line, Mylon Cowens at defensive end and wide receiver, Quatman at running back and defensive back, Falke at linebacker and tight end and McKee on the defensive line and offensive line.

Linebacker Carson Heffner, defensive back Josh Young, defensive end Isaac Leppert, defensive lineman Jaylen Williams, slot back Michael Quatman and offensive linemen Brady Malcom, Andrew Baldauf and Chris Crnkovich are returning starters.

LCC will be part of a league for the first time since the 2012 season after rejoining the Northwest

Conference, where it competed from 2006 to 2012 and was league champion five times in seven years.

Among other benefits, being in a league greatly reduces the amount of travel for the Thunderbirds.

Some of the longest trips LCC has taken since the last time it was in a league include Beverly Fort Frye (192 miles), Gates Mill Gilmour Academy (182 miles), Cambridge (176 miles), Mogadore (165 miles). Licking Valley (127 miles), Huron (119 miles),

Lucas (106 miles) and Columbus Bishop Hartley (101 miles).

The longest road trip for the Thunderbirds this season will be 42 miles when they go to Fort Loramie. The second-longest trip will be going 36 miles to Crestview. Seven of LCC's games will be played in Allen County.

"We used to play Fort Loramie and that was the shortest trip on our schedule," Palte said.

"We've had some great experiences, we've traveled

to some really cool places. We've played in a lot of half-empty stadiums. We've played some weird teams at weird times where maybe there were five fans in the away stands.

"I think the environment (in the NWC) and having some familiarity with our opponents will be exciting for our kids," he said. "I was in the NWC for a long time (as a player and a coach). I know how awesome the environment is on Friday night at those places."

program enough to volunteer their time and do that? We just have a special person in Ned, and every time I ask for something, he provides it," Schafer said.

"Technology-wise, we almost look like ESPN studios when we show up to our field. To me, it's like, 'Why wouldn't you want to take advantage of that? You have to have the right people to do it."

But how much is too much? How many numbers or tendencies can be put in front of a coach before he overthinks a decision?

Defiance's Travis Cooper and Bluffton's Jeff Richards think there's a point where teams can take it too far.

"It's a fine line," Cooper said. "I think there are times when it can be information overload, but there are some things out there that are really helpful. You can get tendencies and percentages in certain situations when coaches like to do certain things. Those kinds of things definitely help."

Richards added, "It's huge, but just like with anything, you can go too far, one way or another. We'll go as far back as we can if a team has a longterm coordinator, we'll look at what they did three

or four years ago to see if things have changed.

"At the same time, you can tell me that 100% of the time a team is going to do this, then they might decide to do something else, and you get burned. We definitely look at the analytics, but it's not a crutch. It's not something we're going to lean on 100% of the time."

Then there's the other end of the argument.

Some schools believe in the "old school mentality" of conservative play. It relies on a stout defense, strong special teams play and minimizing offensive mistakes to win football

games. It's something that Jim Tressel made famous during his run as coach of the Ohio State Buckeyes.

Sometimes it's about the style of play; other times it's about program numbers or even special teams being the strongest unit on the team.

Pandora-Gilboa, a program that has a 35-man roster, might not develop true tendencies because players might be forced to play a number of different positions in the same game.

"Where we're at, we don't have the time to really focus on the analytics too much, because we never know who's going to be in

the game," Rockets coach Matt Hershey said. "We don't have backups at positions so if somebody goes down, we might start moving players around to different spots on the field."

Cole Harting, of Crestview, said the whole concept might have already hurt the game. The former math teacher went on to say his in-game decisions haven't been impacted by the use of analytics.

Harting also has the luxury of having Hayden Perrott, who's a strong kicker with the ability to knock through a field goal or pin a team deep with a punt.

"You see guys not taking field goals even when they should because they have a good kicker," Harting said. "They make decisions based on analytics, and I get it, but I'd rather put some points on the board and force the other team to score than miss a fourth down in field goal territory."

Some programs attempt to gather as much intel as possible, while also relying on game flow.

Other teams have shrugged off the extra information entirely.

It's hard to say who's right or wrong because numbers don't lie, but instincts are important.

Analytics or no analytics, every team just wants one thing — to win football games.

THE ORIGIN OF SPORTS ANALYTICS

The idea of using analytics and statistics to affect your gameplan is hardly a new discussion.

It's something that originated more than 60 years ago, and it's a concept that's still developing today.

In the 1800s, Henry Chadwick, a former cricket reporter for the New York Times, was inspired by a baseball game between New York's Gotham and Eagles to push the use of statistics in baseball.

Chadwick invented the box score. He's the "Father of Sport Analytics and Informatics," according to the Digital Museum of Sport Analytics & Informatics.

His work provided the base for sabermetrics, a blanket term for sports analytics coined by Bill James, the brain behind Moneyball, the concept that former Oakland Athletics General Manager Billy Beane applied to run his low-budget team in the early 2000s.

Beane relied on the principle that a player's overall performance on the field is more important than traditional stats like batting average or home runs. Instead, he used metrics like on-base percentage and defensive runs saved to find value in players that other teams may have overlooked.

That's the long answer.

is it started right here in Ohio. Paul Brown, a former head coach of both professional football teams in the state, started using film study and analytics to study his opponents back in 1946.

Brown is the first recorded coach in the NFL to do so. He found the most common formations and plays run by his opponents in the upcoming game and created what is now commonly known as a scout team.

Coaches around the league took notice and began to adopt similar practices in the 1970s.

The use of analytics in football has continued to expand today with people like Paul DePodesta, the chief strategy officer for the Cleveland Browns.

Ironically, DePodesta got his start in baseball and eventually introduced the principles to Beane, and the two worked in Oakland's front office together for five years.

In 2016, after 20 years of experience in baseball, DePodesta was hired by the Browns, and he installed his system of beliefs into the organization, everywhere from the front office to the coaching

As of 2023, the Browns had eight people on staff dedicated solely to the analytics department.

Bath looks to go from surprise to success

BATH TOWNSHIP — Through the first six weeks of last season, Bath went 4-2. The Wildcats upset defending state-champion New Bremen 14-7 in week one and pulled out one-score victories against Shawnee, Elida and Ottawa-Glandorf.

Unfortunately for the Wildcats, their last victory came on Sept. 22 against the Titans.

A back-loaded schedule included Celina, Defiance, Wapakoneta and St. Marys, four of the top five teams in the Western Buckeye League.

Those four losses, and a first-round playoff exit against eventual state champion Glenville, left Bath with a final record of 4-7.

That's a four-win improvement from 2022, when the Wildcats went 0-10.

Last season was about changing the culture for the then-first-year coach Frank Russell. This season, it's about building on that successful first half and taking another step forward.

"The foundation of our program is that we want to get better every single day," said Russell, who enters his second year at Bath. "Everything else will take care of itself. That's our goal as a team for both the players and the coaching staff."

Part of getting better for the Wildcats is determining the best option to lead the offense.

Last year's starting quarterback Zach Welsch, a 2022 WBL honorable mention, is battling it out for the job with sophomore Dylan Cole, who's coming off a strong junior varsity season as a freshman.

Russell used scrimmage season to determine the winner.

Daniel played really well last year, and we know what Zach did for us," Russell said. "He was a warrior every week who gave us everything he had and he left it all on the field. Without a doubt. both of those are in our top 22, so they're going to be playing a lot of varsity football.'

Welsch passed for 1,816 yards and seven touchdowns as a sophomore. He also carried the ball 91 times for 331 yards and scored 13 touchdowns.

Regardless of which player is named starting quarterback, Russell said the other will slot into

another prominent offensive role.

Playing the team's 22 best players is important to the coaching staff. One player who definitely fits the bill is running back Mikey Hale.

The 5-8, 150-pound Hale ran for 1,040 yards and five touchdowns last season on 175 carries. He finished second on the team in total yards only to Welsch, earning him a spot on the WBL's second team.

Hale, who accounted for 66% of Bath's rushing offense, even drew a smile from his head coach after a mention of his development.

"He's really fun to coach because he works really hard, and he's worked on his body. He didn't have a WBLready body last year, but that's not the case this year," Russell said of Hale. "He's going to bring everything else he normally brings, but now he's stronger, faster, quicker, and we're pretty excited about him."

Defensively, Bath is a work in progress.

During its five-game losing streak to end the 2023 season, the Wildcats surrendered 38 points per game.

Junior Carson Kinnaird returns after recording a team-high 97 tackles and 5.5 sacks. He's joined by Liam Sullivan, Vinny Vendetta, Jack Rader, Kyle sell thinks his team can Slaght, Andru McDermot, take advantage of come Ethan Stevens, Foster Deters and Espn Mikesell, who all lettered in 2023.

The Wildcats put together their best defensive game on week one against New Bremen, where they limited the Cardinals to seven points.

"We played well on defense at times last year," Russell said. "It wasn't a complete wash, but I felt like our kids started to realize what level of toughness they need to play with on defense. You need to be a little bit different to play defense. We want to run fast and hit hard. That's a motto we're trying to live up to this year."

Bath has the benefit of a backloaded schedule with games against Celina, Defiance, Wapakoneta and St. Marys coming in weeks 6-10.

The Wildcats dropped from Division IV, Region 14 to Division V, Region 20 for the 2024 season. It's something that Rusplayoff time.

"That could be beneficial for us, but we still have to play in the WBL," he said. "In this league, you have to be at your best every week to win games. What we focus on controlling what we can control so we can go out and compete on Friday nights.'

Bath opens with New Bremen on Aug. 23, then enters conference play on Aug. 30 against Van Wert, followed by Shawnee and Kenton. They'll face Elida and Ottawa-Glandorf before facing that fourgame gauntlet to close out the regular season.



Elida leaning on speed, experience

ELIDA – Experience and speed are normally key factors for success.

Elida head football coach Kyle Harmon hopes those two ingredients will help pave the way for a winning season for his squad.

Elida returns 14 letter winners from last year's team that went 5-6 overall and 4-5 in the Western Buckeye League. The Bulldogs competed in the Division III playoffs, where they lost to Butler in the first round.

For Elida, it all starts on the offensive side of the football.

"Ryan McGue (Sr., 6-4, 205), our quarterback, is back," Harmon said. "We were 4-0 last year (when he started). He had a leg injury, which obviously set us back. He's back and healthy. He's ready to go. He's worked extremely hard."

McGue said he is back to his old form.

"I feel like I'm 100 percent. I went through a lot of physical therapy. Now, I can't even tell," he said.

There will be plenty of weapons around McGue as the Bulldogs will employ a spread offense.

"Amari Wash (Jr., 5-10, 175, WR/RB) is back," Harmon said. "He (Wash) has put on about 15, 18 pounds. ... He looks like a different kid. He's a lot more physical this year, and his strength numbers have gone up, big time. Tyler Dillon (Sr., 6-2, 190, WR) and Noah Jostpille (Jr., 6-4, 190, WR) are the outside receivers. Elisha Reddick (Jr., 6-0, 175, WR) came out - a track guy. He (Reddick) is a two-time 400-meter WBL champion. He hasn't played football before, but he's learning a lot and played really well over the summer.

"Then, we had a tight end, Connor Konopka (Jr., 6-3, 195) who came in from an Elida family that moved back to the area, so we expect big things from him at that spot. Taking

is Cam Kaufman (Jr., 5-10, 170). He (Kaufman) is a track guy. Jayair Morgan (Sr., 5-7, 170, RB), came back out. Tyler Dillon (Sr., 6-2, 190, WR/DB) is back for us. Kohen Sullivan (So., WR/RB/LB) will get a lot of time. We have some pretty good skill (players)."

Tyler Dillon is confident about this year's offensive unit

unit.
"I think we have a little more speed than we did last year," Dillon said. "We might be a little smaller on the O-line, but I feel like we can still do some damage down there. I feel like we'll be the same or even better than last year.

"We kind of fell apart when he (McGue) got hurt last year. I think we'll do better this year (on offense)."

Last season, Elida ranked seventh in the WBL in total offensive production. The Bulldogs rushed for 1,565 yards and passed for 1,296 vards.

"We're going to change it up a little bit," Harmon said about his offense. "Our skill guys are built a little bit different. We had David (Etzkorn) last year, who could pound the ball downhill. Now we have a lot more speed offensively than we had last year. We might try to spread things out. We're going to try to get the ball to our athletes out in space."

Last year as a senior, Etzkorn rushed for 836 yards and had 11 touchdowns. Etzkorn, who also played linebacker, is now playing football at the University of Findlay.

Defensively, the Bulldogs will utilize 4-3 and 4-2-5 schemes.

"We will be similar (to last season)," Harmon said. "We lost a lot of guys on the defensive side. Up front, we return Parker Crim (Jr., 6-3, 235, DE/OT) and Tyler Siefker (Sr., DL/C). We also expect some of the other guys to step up. They've worked hard in the weight room.

"Carter Kerby (Jr., 5-11, 220, DL/OL) got some snaps last year on the D-line. Aaryn Dailey (So., 5-10, 200, DL) also got some snaps on the D-line. Both of those guys have probably put on about 20 pounds."

In 2023, Elida was ranked third in the WBL in total team defense as it allowed 270.5 yards per game. Opponents scored on average, 23 points per contest (fifth in the WBL) against the Bulldogs.

Crim is optimistic about this year's defensive unit.

"We will probably be better this year because we have more speed than we had last year. All of that will complement one another, more than it did last year," Crim said.

Crim, who is being highly recruited by Division I colleges, is not going to allow the recruiting process to deter his focus.

"Not really (going to worry about the future). I just have to do my job, and everything will follow through after that," Crim said.

Tyler Siefker, who plays both ways on a regular basis, is not concerned about what position he plays. He just wants to be on the field as much as possible.

"I've been at center since my sophomore year. I like it there, but I know every position (on the O-line), so it's whatever," Siefker said with a grin. "On defense, they put me at end last year but I've always been on the D-line.

"To be honest, ever since midget football, I've always been an offensive player. I'm just really down to the footwork. So, that's where offense came into play. Defense just came into play. ... It all works hand-in-hand."

Added Harmon, "They (Crim, Siefker) are weight room guys. They work extremely hard. They lift together. They're on the all-time boards for all the lifts. They push each other. They balance each other out. They're two guys who just do their jobs."

Harmon said the WBL will once again be very competitive.

"Week-in and week-out, the Western Buckeye League is a tough conference. It is going to be a battle every Friday night," he said.

Ottawa-Glandorf looks to compete in WBL

OTTAWA – Longtime Ottawa-Glandorf football head coach Ken Schriner wants his team to run the football as much as possible.

Last season, Ottawa-Glandorf struggled at that, which resulted in a 1-9 overall record, and a mark of 1-8 in the Western Buckeye League.

"If you look at the plays we ran last year, we were about as close to 50/50 as we have ever been in my coaching career. That tells me that we're throwing the ball too much," Schriner said with a smile. "The goal is to always say 50/50, but to keep the defense off-balance, we want to run the ball. We want to try to grind it out and keep the possession. We're not a wide-open (offensive) team by any stretch. However, I think this year, we're also going to have the ability to throw the ball down the field.'

In 2023, the Titans averaged 89.2 rushing yards per contest, ninth in the WBL.

Returning at quarterback for O-G is senior Peyton Kuhlman (6-foot-4, 200 pounds, QB/DB). Last season, Kuhlman completed 127 of 261 passes

for 1,495 yards with 13 touchdowns and 10 interceptions.

"Peyton (Kuhlman) is a returning starter (quarterback). He's a three-year starter now," Schriner said. "We really have high expectations for him. We're probably going to give him a little more responsibility on the field. We need him to take on the leadership role and work with the rest of those guys."

Kuhlman will have plenty of weapons around him this season as the Titans will once again employ a spread offense.

"Grant Evers (Sr., 6-0, 200, RB/DB) is a returning running back, along with Vinnie Brinkman (Sr., 6-0, 210, RB/LB)," Schriner said. "Those two guys were the main part of our running back tandem last year. So, they're back with a lot of experience, and we have high expectations.

On the outside, we have Deegan Miller (So., 6-3, 180, WR/DB). He (Miller) is going to be a weapon for us. Dane Duling (Sr., 6-4, 200, TE/ DL) will be at tight end. Last year, Dane was a guy that we didn't use a whole lot at tight end, but track (this past spring) did him a world of good. Those

guys (Miller and Duling) were out there (for track) and really got faster. I think the league will recognize those two guys as being dangerous."

The Titans have 26 letter winners returning this season. Out of those returners, 10 were starters in 2023.

'We have a number of guys with experience back. Hopefully, that helps us out in the long run," Schriner said. "Was it (last season) a good experience? ... I don't know. That remains to be seen but the best part is, we got bigger and stronger in the offseason. I think we also got faster. The kids grew up. The sophomores became juniors. The juniors became seniors. Hopefully, that experience bodes well in the long run."

O-G returns some key players on the offensive

"Up front, we have a lot of guys back with experience," Schriner said. "The right tackle, Hayden Kaufman (Sr., 6-2, 255, OL/DL) is back. Right guard, Austin Haley (Sr., 5-11, 225, OL/DL), is back as a returning starter as well. Some of the other guys have experience. However, we just have to put it together and see what happens."

In 2023, O-G's defense ranked seventh overall in the WBL. The Titans hope to tighten up on the defensive side of the football this season.

"Defensively, we have a lot of guys back. Our guys up front are going to be two-way players," Schriner said. "We have some sophomores that are going to step up. Hopefully, they mature in a hurry and can handle the pressure of our schedule. We know there are no easy games."

Schriner is pleased with the number of players on this year's roster.

"We're at 80 (players) for the four grades. Numbers are up. I'm excited about that," he said. "I think the kids are having fun out there. So far, our practices have been much more intense and much more physical. Our mantra this year is to hit. We want to go out and be hitters. I think last year, we were pushed around by some teams because we were not mature and physical enough. I learned a long time ago that you cannot coach big. ... You have to become big. So, that's a challenge for us. I think our kids did a great job in the offseason. Now, they can go out there, learn the techniques and play football."

Confidence the first building block for Shawnee

When Shane Wireman became Waynesfield-Goshen's head football coach in 2017 the Tigers were coming off back-to-back 0-10 seasons.

By his fifth season, they won nine games, then won 11 games in 2022 and 10 games in 2023. When he was hired as

this year the Indians had just completed an 0-10 season.

Shawnee's head coach earlier

So, no surprise, he has

been asked if there are similarities between the two situations and what he learned at Waynesfield-Goshen that can be used at Shawnee.

"The similarities I see are getting the kids confident again," Wireman said. "It's just getting that confidence back that we want to emphasize.

"Sometimes you can beat yourself just by not believing you can get the job done. We've got to get that mindset changed. If you have a bad play, OK, move on to the

next one. Don't dwell on last week. This week is a new game and a new opportunity," he said.

'We have to get that confidence up and go out there and put it together. We want to establish a program and put some pride back in Shawnee football."

Shawnee has 14 lettermen back from last season's team, including Akyus Richardson, a H-back/defensive lineman who was honorable mention All-Western Buckeye League on defense.

Shawnee ranked tenth in scoring in the WBL (12.7 points a game) and ninth in points allowed (31.3 points a game).

"I would like to see us work on being more consistent offensively. Our players have done a good job of picking up the new system but we still have some kinks to work out from time to time. Defensively, we want to continue to focus on being able to stop the run consistently and not allow the explosive plays, start forcing more

turnover to give our offense some short fields."

J.J. Spyker, who passed for 708 yards and 6 touchdowns last season, and Caleb Bacome are competing for the starting quarterback job.

"Both players bring some great qualities to the position and both impact the game with their arm and on the ground," Wireman said. "I look for both players to contribute to our team in big ways.'

Reece Davidson, a wide receiver and a defensive back who did not play football

last season, "brings a lot of play-making ability to our team on both sides of the ball," according to Wireman.

Kobe Bentz and Richardson "will be anchoring our offensive and defensive lines," he said. "There is some talent

back. There is a lot of competition. I think some of the kids are learning a spot is not just going to be handed to you. We want guys to go out there and compete on every rep (repetition) and every play.'

St. Marys enters season with high expectations

St. Marys enters the fall with elevated expectations and with its sights on a league-high 26th Western Buckeye League championship.

Bo Frye, who's led the Roughriders to at least one playoff win in his first three seasons, has had plenty of success as head coach, but one thing that has eluded him during his tenure is that WBL title.

The Riders' last conference crown came in 2018 as part of a three-peat under former head coach Doug Frye.

"The number one goal is to win the WBL championship. It will never change here," said Bo Frye. "At some point, we have to get back to winning WBL championships, and every year with how hard we work, I think we stay in that mix. In the last two years, if things would've bounced our way we would have had two league championships.'

St. Marys went 7-5 last year before falling to Perkins in the second round of the OHSAA Playoffs.

Fortunately for them, they bring a plethora of upperclassmen and returning starters back to the front line, including 19 returning starters and 15 seniors.

Two of those pieces are a pair of 1,000-yard rushers, Colton Mabry (221 rushes, 1,456 yards, 19 touchdowns) and Dominik Osbourne (198 rushes, 1,258 yards, 9 touchdowns). Both will play prominent roles in

the Roughiders' patented Wing-T offense.

"A tiger doesn't change its stripes," said Frye of his offensive philosophy. "We don't plan to change our stripes. Running the ball is what we do here and our kids are good at executing it. We start running the Wing-T at a young level. It's something that we believe in and we have success doing it. We're going to run the football and we have a couple of quarterbacks that can throw the

ball if needed.

Frye is hopeful that the overall talent his team brings back on a roster with 21 seniors helps get them off to a better start.

Last year, St. Marys went 0-4 before flipping the switch and finishing strong. Another start like that could cost the Roughriders a chance at competing in the WBL.

Defensively St. Marys brings back over half of a unit that allowed 18.1 points per game. That group includes two of the Roughriders' top three

leading tacklers from 2023, Cameron Dammeyer (89 tackles) and Noah Dixon (85 tackles).

"We will shuffle around our defensive formation based on which team we play that week," said Frye. "In the WBL, we see so many distinctive styles so we have to stay ready. We return a lot of experience on that side of the ball and that will help.

"Owen Otte is a sophomore who will start for us on the defensive line along with Caleb Turner.

He (Turner) played a lot last year and had an active motor. Taylor Compton is a big piece of our linebacking core, and of course, Noah Dixon is well known in our secondary."

Lawrence shrugs off 'traditional football'

LIMA — In a conversation about what the statistics tell you to do in football, there's always one anomaly.

That's Bill Lawrence at Lima Senior, a former assistant under two legendary Kenton coaches, Brent Fackler and Hall-of-Famer Mike Mauk, who studied under Kevin Kellev at Pulaski Academy.

Kelley, who's currently the head coach at Sheridan High School in Arkansas, gained notoriety for his playing style, which includes a pass-heavy offense, rarely ever punting, always going for two after a touchdown and

kicking multiple onside kicks in a game.

It's a formula that's produced positive results in both Mauk's and Kelley's careers.

In 31 years at Kenton, Mauk compiled a record of 221-122. He led the Wildcats to back-to-back state championships in 2001 and 2002.

Kelley had a winning percentage while serving as head coach at Pulaski Academy from 2003-2020. During that time, he led the program to nine Arkansas Activities Association State Championships and finished his tenure with a record of 216-29-1.

So does the system work? The answer to that

question has been a resounding yes, and Lawrence has carried on the

beliefs of his mentors.

He said it's about two things, putting pressure on the other team and using the power of the unknown.

'Your team has to believe in what you're doing," Lawrence said. "When you take that lead and you're up eight against a team that doesn't like to go for two, you make them have to make some different decisions.

"After we score, you also have to defend all the onside kicks that we do."

Lawrence said the object behind the onside kick is to demoralize the other team. He points

to odds that say when a team recovers at least one also its starting quarteronside kick in a game, the percentage of that team winning the game goes up to about 80.

The Spartans recovered multiple onside kicks in more than one game last year.

"It just turned the game," Lawrence said. Last season we were up six at halftime and we came out and recovered two onside kicks in the third quarter. All of a sud-

den we were up 21. "I would hope that teams have to prepare 15-30 minutes per day for that because you never know what we're going to do. I may dream something up the night before a game, and then we'll do it."

It's also a matter of keeping Lima Senior's offense in rhythm. That's not something that can happen if the Spartans kick the ball deep and the other team has a long 90-yard scoring drive.

In a worst-case scenario where the Spartans allow their opponent to score, he wants them to do it quickly.

And when Lima Senior gets the ball back, sometimes its best defense is its offense. They use all four downs to get 10 yards, which can alter playcalling.

In a rare situation where the offense isn't moving the ball, the Spartans might punt — but it's not that simple.

The team's punter is back, Ja'Niaus Hall, and when he punts, he does it out of the offense, not in a true punt formation.

It's just another scenario that's about trying to catch the opposing team on its heels.

Lawrence never backs down from this way of thinking. He said that even when he plays his players in EA Sports College Football '25, a video game, he never punts, he always goes for two and he kicks multiple onside kicks.

The Spartans embrace analytics to an extreme degree, and Lawrence knows that it may be viewed as unconventional, but he sees the logic behind all of it.

"Some coaches might look at it from the other sideline," he said, "and say something like, 'Hey there's a crazy guy on the other side. We never know what he's going to do,' and then they're ready for anything, but at the end of the day. there is a method to our madness."

Wapak aims for 4th-straight WBL title

WAPAKONETA — Wapakoneta is the standard in the Western Buckeye League.

In 2023, the Redskins won their third consecutive league title, and it doesn't appear they'll be slowing down anytime soon.

That success starts at the top with coach Travis Moyer, who enters his 11th season at Wapak.

His team went 10-3 last year with an 8-1 record in the WBL and made it all the way to the regional semifinals before suffering a 14-10 loss to Hamilton Badin in an injury-riddled game.

It was the second-straight season the two teams met in the playoffs, and both times, Badin pulled out a one-score win.

The Redksins led until the final two seconds of its season despite losing starting quarterback Caleb Moyer to a broken collarbone and running back Jace Knous to a knee injurv.

It was a heartbreaker, but the program didn't dwell on it.

They hit the weight room in January in an effort to have another strong offseason.

For Moyer and the Redskins, that's where sustaining success begins.

"Our kids understand the importance of lifting," he said, "and it's something that sets the precedent that we need to need to be at our best if we want to compete for a championship. Our kids have bought into that.

"As a program, we've played in a lot of big games. It's that preparation that starts in January that gives us a chance to compete at the highest level."

The top offseason priority for Wapakoneta has been to get its starting quarterback healthy. By the look of things, Caleb Moyer's collarbone seems to be back at full strength.

The 6-2, 190-pound junior spent the summer throwing with or competing against some of the top arms in the state, names such as Findlay's Ryan Montgomery (University of Georgia com-

There are holes to fill, but that's nothing new for Moyer and his staff.



Kenton aims for higher standard, more wins

KENTON - With two state championships, two state runners-up and six other trips to the semifinals of the state football playoffs in the last 32 years, expectations are always high at Kenton.

For the last three seasons, results have not been on the high end of the scale for the Wildcats, who went 3-7 last season, 1-9 two years ago and 0-10 the year before that.

In trying to get more positive outcomes on Friday nights in the present, Kenton coach Zach Turner has looked into the past and emphasized what he calls the standard of Kenton football.

"At the end of my second year I started evaluating things a lot harder," Turner said. "What I learned is we've got to create the right behaviors, we've got to create the right mindsets. That's what made Kenton football great. We had kids who worked really hard, we had kids who loved the program and poured their heart and soul into it.

"When I say get back to the standard of Kenton football, what I believe Ken- yards and 11 touchdowns. ton football was is blue collar, gritty kids who worked hard. Our kids have really taken to that aspect. We're starting to see that standard come back" he said.

Kenton's offense is led by quarterback Korbin Johnston and receiver Grady Kleman-Beazley, both of whom were second-team All-Western Buckeye League selections last season.

Johnston, a four-year starter, passed for 2,712 yards and 19 touchdowns last season and rushed for 796 yards and 11 touchdowns. Kleman-Beazley had 90 catches for 1,007

Turner calls Johnston "one of our best leaders," and said, "He never misses a day of weight lifting. He's been there every single day from Dec. 1 to now. He is what you ask for in a senior quarterback."

The Kenton coach said Kleman-Beazley "is a kid we have high expectations for."

"We have a good group of receivers. Maddox Hommel, a sophomore is going to be a big piece of that. Blaine Bushong is going to be in the slot. We have Carson Delong coming back Steven Piper is going to be a split end and Zayne Perkins is

going to be a slot on the other side." Turner said.

"I have really high expectations for our receiving corps and their ability to make plays and to block on the perimeter, which is important."

Linebacker Jayden Mustain had a big freshman season last year with 95 tackles and was honorable mention All-WBL.

Kenton ranked first in the WBL in total offense (421.4 yards per game) last season but was only sixth in the league in scoring at 23.4 points a game.

Defensively, the Wildcats were ninth in the WBL in

yards allowed (375.5 yards per game) and tenth in points given up (36.1 per game).

"We stalled a little bit in the red zone and Korbin kind of got banged up late in the season. A big emphasis is how we score the ball, and how we put the ball in the end zone. You've got to be able to score when you get down in there. You can't settle for no points or three points. That's a big emphasis for us this year," Turner said.

"Our defense is going to be much improved. That tenth in points allowed is going to change," he said.

Van Wert rebuilds with hopes to compete

VAN WERT — Van Wert has developed a track record under coach Keith Recker.

The Cougars tend to be extremely skilled on offense with one of the league's best athletes at quarterback.

They almost always roll out a talented group of playmakers who pose a multitude of threats from all sides of the field.

And they've consistently competed for the top spot in the WBL standings.

All of that has been true in the past. But 2024 comes with a different set of challenges.

While still very talented, Van Wert is much younger and much more inexperienced than in past seasons.

However, one thing that hasn't changed is the attitude and work ethic that Recker and his staff instill in

its players. "These guys have really come in with a good mentality and a good attitude," Recker said. "I think they understand that we lost quite a bit over the last few years, so they understand that there's a lot of work to be put in, but their attitude has been better than expected and they're ready to go."

For the Cougars, it comes down to learning techniques that come with a spread offense and a 4-2-5 defensive scheme.

It's a tall task to replace the production of 14 starters on an 8-4 team, but having a well-rounded athlete under center always helps, and this year that player is Briston Wise.

After appearing in 11 games last season at running back, quarterback and defensive back, Wise becomes the full-time starter for the Cougars over sophomore Keaten Welch and freshman Zac Crummey.

Wise collected 334 yards on offense with two touchdowns in 2023.

"We want to put an athlete and a good arm back there, and Briston is both of those things," Recker said. "He threw a no-hitter at the ACME state tournament, and he can run around everywhere. He's done a really good job of taking control of that position.

"Like every year, we want to get the run game going so that Briston doesn't have to sit back and throw it 40 times. That's one of his strengths, so we hope we can do a better job of establishing that."

Both Welch and Crummey will slot in at different positions with prominent roles in the offense, but Recker stated that all three players are capable of taking snaps.

Crummey, a 6-5, 220pound freshman, made quite an impression on the coaching staff in the offseason and the early parts of camp.

"He's a big, tall, strong kid. He's going to be really good. Right now it's just about learning for him," Recker said. "He's playing some H-back for us, and he runs the ball really well in between the tackles. He's a tough guy for the defense to bring down."

After serving as a backup during his junior season, Case Stegaman will play a prominent role on both sides of the ball, splitting time at running back with Geary Hilleary, who's also in line for carries. Geary's older brother, Jake, was a starting running back during his time at Van Wert a handful

of seasons ago. Keaten Welch slots in at wide receiver along with sophomore Micah Cowan and Nate Gearhart, a threeyear junior varsity player who's in line for his first prominent role at the varsity level.

"He never stopped working, and he's faster this year, running in the 4.7's," Recker said of Gearhart. "He has great hands, and he's a smart player."

Returning lettermen on the offensive line include Nick Edwards (5-10, 270), Chance Youngpeter (6-0, 225) and Trevor Dotson (6-3, 215).

At one point last season, 21 of Van Wert's 22 starters were seniors. That was a hard pill to swallow, especially on the defensive side where the Cougars allowed 30 points per game.

Other players in the rotation were young, like Donovan Winkeljohn (6-0, 155) and Micah Cowan (6-0, 175), who combined for 63 tackles and five interceptions.

Caine Shobe (5-8, 150) joins those two in the secondary and Nick Edwards (5-10, 270) anchors the defensive line.

"We had to take a good look at ourselves going into this season to evaluate who we have and what they'll be good at," said Recker of his personnel. "It's all about making sure our scheme fits us and not the other way around. We've had a lot of communication about that between the coaches and players about why we're doing what we're doing. These guys have to be assignment-sound and able to take care of their responsibilities. We've done a better job of that

early on in practice." The Cougars finished 2023 in a three-way tie for third place in the WBL standings. They'll open with Bryan at home on Aug. 23, followed by Bath and defending conference champion Celina.

That game against the Bulldogs opens a four-week stretch where the Cougars also take on Defiance, Wapakoneta and St. Marys.

"In our league, there are no games where we can just walk on the field and out-athlete or out-physical someone. We really have to be ready to bring it every week," Recker said. "Our guys expect to win. That's something they've learned how to do and we hope that pays dividends early on this year."

CELINA - Celina enters the 2024 season looking to defend its share of the Western Buckeye League championship.

It was the eighth time the Bulldogs had captured the WBL title and that run of success didn't end until they were one game away from the Division III State Championship game.

A season like that builds high expectations.

"Last year was a fun ride. We had a great group of kids," said Celina coach Brennen Bader. "That was a group of kids that paid their dues and fought through tons of adversity in their careers. We still have kids left over from that roster and we hope that experience builds into this season."

Bader enters his eighth season coming off a 12-3 record in 2023. The seniors on his roster have seen a complete turnaround since their freshman season when they went 1-9 in 2021. The same group went 6-5 in 2022 before last year's historic run.

"We felt as a coaching staff that we had something special brewing. The next year we made the playoffs and that really sparked our run in 2023. Now, most of that same group comes back and these upcoming seniors have seen the entire process. We believe that will help them this season."

Last season the Bulldogs averaged 288 yards per game. 206 of those yards came on the ground. A big piece of that rushing attack was second-team all-state selection Braylon Gabes, who had 1,178 all-purpose

vards and 10 touchdowns as a senior.

Dalton Chilicoat, a thirdteam all-state lineman, also brings back experience up front.

"Bobby (Morris) got some playing time for us as a Junior," said Bader. "We had a two-quarterback system last year and he came in during some real key moments and made huge throws, especially in the Defiance game when he helped us seal our share of the WBL."

Defiance aims to continue climb

DEFIANCE — When Travis Cooper took over at Defiance, he inherited a team that went 1-9 in

Since then, the Bulldogs have upped their win total each of the past three seasons, going from 3-7 in 2021 to 7-5 in 2022 and 8-4 last season.

Defiance ended the year in a three-way tie with Van Wert and St. Marys in the WBL standings with a record of 6-3. It was their highest league finish since 2014.

With two straight playoff appearances under their belt and eight returning starters on both sides of the ball, this season is all about continuing that upward trajectory, dealing with expectations and handling the pressure that comes with being a winning program.

"For us, it's about staying hungry and not being satisfied with steps we've already taken," Cooper said. "We were able to sneak up on some people in the past because they knew how we used to be,

but our guys have a little more of an expectation they're being held to. With expectation comes pressure so we'll see how our guys handle that."

Defiance will be tested early, starting with four road games in its first five weeks. That includes a matchup with defending WBL champion Wapakoneta in Week 2, followed by its home opener against St. Marys.

Cooper believes that having a high number of multi-sport athletes is something that lessens the blow of a road-heavy first half, meaning his players are familiar enough with the trips that it won't be a deciding factor in games.



Delphos St. John's has a list of goals for this season but one stands out above the rest — make the play-

The Blue Jays ended last year with a mark of 4-6 overall (2-6 MAC) and although they couldn't work their way over the .500 mark, the season had some memorable moments.

It started with a win over Delphos Jefferson and a come-from-behind victory over Lima Central Catholic.

However, the conference schedule for Delphos St. John's proved to be much more difficult as they suffered shutout losses in back-to-back games against Versailles and Marion Local.

That's where the Blue Jays want to improve.

Todd Schulte begins his 26th season as head coach and despite losing 10 seniors, his team brings back a host of talent with a strong desire to return to the

"We want to build on the guys who have past experience," Schulte said. "Logan Duncan started a few games last year as a freshman and Austin Arnold played a lot of offense. We foresee him (Arnold) doing good things on defense as well this season."

The Blue Jays had a productive season on the defensive side of the ball starting with TJ Werts, the team's leading tackler (55 solo, 84 overall). Werts, as a two-way player, also ran for 565 yards and six touch-

Tyler Lindeman is also in line for a solid role on both sides of the ball.

"Tyler is a part of a solid core we have coming back on both sides," Schulte said.

Drew Boggs should be back under center for the Blue Jays after throwing for 497 yards and seven touchdowns last year in a three-way split for the job

with Grant Ulm and Drake Fittro.

On offense, Delphos St. John's collected 2, 548 total yards with almost an even split between the pass and run (1,213 passing, 1,335 rushing).

The Blue Jays are hoping for an uptick on that side of the ball and a step forward on defense in order for them to compete in the daunting Midwest Athletic Conference.

"I think we play in the best league in the state. Every week is a challenge," Schulte said. "If we can get through our two non-league games at the start and get into league play with a winning record, that would build a lot of confidence."

Delphos St. John's starts its season at home on Aug. 23 against Sidney Lehman. They'll play LCC in week two before hitting the road for their MAC opener on Sept. 6 against Versailles.

Allen East looks to build on key returners

HARROD – Allen East head football coach Joel Billings does not want to look too far ahead.

However, with an all-senior offensive line and depth at the skill positions, Billings is cautiously optimistic about the upcoming season.

In 2023, Allen East went 4-7 overall and 3-4 in the Northwest Conference. The Mustangs got into the Division VI postseason playoffs, where they lost to Anna in the first round.

Allen East returns 13 letter winners from a year ago, including 10 starters.

"We have a good nucleus back," Billings said. "Right now, the offensive line has five seniors, which is pretty rare. I don't know if we've ever had that while I've been a head coach.

"Skill-wise, Ethan Young (Sr., 5-10, 163, WR/DB) will be the top receiver coming back. We feel that we have a pretty good nucleus of guys that are all a little bit similar. Ethan Hershberger (So., 5-9, 148, WR/ DB) is going to be a sophomore, who played some last year. Deacon Jones (5-8, 150, WR/DB) is a junior. He (Jones) has played at some skilled spots."

Allen East also returns its signal-caller and starting running back from a year ago.

"Jackson Thompson (Jr., 5-10, 185) is back at quarterback. Last year was his first year (at quarterback)," Billings said. "Playing quarterback was not what he (Thompson) played in the lower levels. He has made some progress in the seven-on-sevens. He's a great athlete, and really the kind of kid that you would want to play quarterback for you.

... It's somebody you would want, character-wise. We're excited to have him back.

"At running back, Jacob Pinks (Sr., 5-10, 170) is returning. Miles McDorman (So., 5-10, 170) is a sophomore, who made big strides last year in practice and was out there on special teams. He (McDorman)

had a good offseason." Last (regular) season,

Thompson was 63 of 156 passing for 928 yards with six touchdowns and 10 interceptions. He also rushed for 510 yards on 118 carries with 9 touchdowns.

"With Jackson (Thompson at quarterback), we will probably run more than we throw, but we will still be a spread offense. We'll try to stay balanced, and really try to take what's there," Billings said.

Last season, Allen East scored 25.7 points per game. Defensively, the Mustangs gave up 24.8 points per contest.

"At the skill spots, we have a lot of flexibility," Billings said. "We are almost two-deep at most of the skill spots. We feel confident."

On the defensive side of the ball, Allen East yielded 302 vards per game in 2023.

"Defensively, we will be very similar to what we were in the past (3-5-3 scheme). We will just keep building off the system and try to fix the weaknesses," Billings said. "We have Kyden Culbertson (Sr., 6-1, 230, OL/DL) back. Braylon

Paxson (So., 5-10, 190, OL/ DL) is back. He (Paxson) played a lot on offense last year as a freshman. Grant Slusser (Sr., 6-3, 200, LB) is new. He (Slusser) played his freshman year, then came back out.

"Levi Nickles (Sr., 5-10, 165, WR/LB) is back. Ethan Hershberger (So., 5-9, 148, WR/DB) will play safety. Hunter Nickles (Sr., 5-11, 170, WR/LB) is another kid in that senior class who's been biding his time and got a lot of playing time last year. At defensive back, Jackson Friesner (Sr., 5-11, 160, WR/DB) returns. We've got some young guys that are competing for spots, too."

Billings said the Northwest Conference should be very competitive this fall.

"We have two new teams coming in. Fort Loramie has always had the bigframe (type of) kids. With LCC, I think Coach (Scott) Palte is one of the better coaches in the area, if not the best coach in the area. He always seems to utilize his personnel really well. Of

Pirates excited for more this year

BLUFFTON — There's a "different vibe" at Bluffton this year, as allstate linebacker Landen Worcester says.

After back-to-back 5-5 seasons in 2021 and 2022, last year's 12-2 team might've been a surprise. With 20 returning letterwinners and nine returning starters, people know what the Pirates are capable of doing.

"Last year, we'd come out, we're the underdogs," said Worcester, a 5-foot-11, 201-pound all-state first-team linebacker and the team's leading running back from last year. "No one expected us to win. But this year, we have a big X on our back. There's no surprises anymore."

Coach Jeff Richards said he wanted his players to come out every game in 2024 ready to do whatever they needed to win.

"We want to be the hunter, not the hunted," Richards said. "We want to go into every single game expecting to win. We expect to perform at a high level, no matter the situation, no matter where we're at. We want to go into every single game as the aggressor."

It will be hard to top the dominant performance from last year's defense. The Pirates recorded nine

shutouts. They bring back all-state performers at each level of the defense, including honorable mention pick Brody Sommers (6-foot-2, 236 pounds) as a defensive lineman, first-teamer Worcester at linebacker and honorable mention selection Carson Kruse (6-0, 177 pounds) at defensive back after recording 119 tackles last year.

"I feel like that helped me come into this year knowing more about what I'm going to see and the people that I'm going to go against and for my teammates on the line too," said Sommers, who had 48 tackles and three sacks last year. "I can be a vocal point and help them since we had a great senior class last year that

showed me how to do it. Now I can take that role and continue it."

The Pirates will continue an aggressive style, Richards said. Worcester, a middle linebacker, has had at least 100 tackles every year since starting as a freshman. Quinn Eachus (Sr., WR/DB, 5-10, 162 pounds) is back after tallying 10 interceptions over the past two years.

"We want to be a pressure-based defense," he said. "We want to make the other team's offense uncomfortable."

Offensively, there will be some changes. While Worcester is back after rushing for more than 1,700 yards and 26 touchdowns last year, a new face will hand him the

ball. Tayte Giesige, a 6-0, 170-pound sophomore, takes over at quarterback and has different skills than last year's starter, all-state selection Garret Bogart, who signed to play college ball at Defiance College after completing 75% of his passes last year and didn't throw an interception until Week 14.

"Tayte's skill set is different than Garret's, so we're going to use him a little bit differently," Richards said. "... He can run a little bit."

The Pirates will compete in a revamped Northwest Conference, which saw Ada and Leipsic leave with perennial playoff contenders Fort Loramie and Lima Central Catholic joined.

The Pirates finish off the season against leaguechampion Columbus Grove.

"I think it's as competitive as it's ever been," Richards said. "I maintain that until somebody knocks off Grove, they should be the favorite. ... The conference, just like it should be, every week you can't have an off game."

The Pirates believe they're up for the challenge.

"We have the X on our back now," Sommers said. "Last year, we shocked a lot of people. This year, we're the ones that are expected to succeed. So we just have to work hard every day. We need to play as a group, focus and practice as hard as we can."

Grove won't back away from high expectations

COLUMBUS GROVE — If you're a football player at Columbus Grove, you learn not to back away from high expectations.

The football schedule lists every game through the state championship, and the Bulldogs have been to the state semifinals the past two years. With 20 letterwinners back from last year's 12-3 team, the team isn't shy about its expectations.

"We expect to get to Week 15 and play Marion Local (in the state semifinal)," said Trenton Barraza, a 6-foot-1, 190-pound senior and four-year letterwinner who plays running back and linebacker for the Bulldogs. "You know, we're pushing every week for better and better. We want to win one week at a time, but in the back of our heads. we've got Week 15 in our head. We need to do everything we can to get to that game and then win more."

For a team that's made the playoffs the last four years and won or shared the Northwest Conference title five of the last six seasons, expectations are part of the game. They'll move down from Division VI to Division VII this year.

"Maybe I shouldn't say it, but it is kind of the standard here now," coach Andy Schafer said. "That being said, what we've talked about is, 'How do we raise the standard?' How do we make it even farther?"

The Bulldogs' depth certainly helps. They have nine first-year lettermen, nine second-year lettermen and two third-year lettermen. One of those is Barraza, who topped 1,900 yards with 21 touchdowns on the ground last year. He's

already at top form, Schafer said, comparing his field vision now to the Carey playoff game last season. He's also developed into a

stronger leader.

Findlay last year. Barraza is back for his senior season for the Bulldogs.

"I felt like he was kind of hitting his stride, hitting his peak in that game," Schafer said. "There were some big plays with his vision that I hadn't seen develop, and I'm already seeing it in practice, which is obviously insane to think of."

The Bulldogs also have quarterback Landon Best

Brady Basinger (Soph., 6-1, 205) is at tight end or H-back. There were three graduations from the offensive line, including both guards, but their replacements are coming along, Schafer said.

The other three-year letterwinner is Kylan Mayes, a sacks. "It just gives them a break, and it gets the fans

excited, gets our team going when we get to the QB."

They'll miss some large bodies from last year on the defensive line, Schafer said, but they do have at least two guys back on the defensive line, linebacking corps and defensive backfield.

"I think you just have to adapt," Schafer said. "That's where we're at right now, trying to figure out how we adapt to not having size. That's one thing a coach can't coach. Still, I like the way our defense is playing."

The Bulldogs can't afford to get off to a slow start like they did last year when they started 1-2 before going on an 11-game win streak. A tough Northwest Conference awaits them, especially with playoff regulars Fort Loramie and Lima Central Catholic joining the league.

"Obviously this year, I think we really just want to start off strong," Mayes said. "In previous years, we hadn't been starting off strong. This year, we really want to come out and get off to a big start."

It's a tough task, though, with Pandora-Gilboa, Liberty-Benton and Patrick Henry all opening up the year before the NWC gauntlet begins. They wrap up the regular season against Bluffton, which the Bulldogs beat by a touchdown in the regular-season finale and playoffs in 2023.

"We've done a lot of team-building activities," Schafer said. "We've had some talks, and we've done everything we can to make sure that everybody's buying in early and understanding the importance of the early games because our schedule is brutal."

The 6-2, 175-pound Zipfel enters his fourth season as the starter after throwing for 1,460 yards and 20 touchdowns. He added 272 yards on the ground and seven touchdowns as a iunior.

"He got thrown in there as a freshman and the growth he's had since then is remarkable," Cooper said. "It's such a luxury as a head coach and play-caller to have a guy who's thinking along the same lines as you. Any coach will tell you that the growing pains of a young quarterback are rough, but it's going to pay dividends eventually and that's where we're at with Brez."

Cooper said Zipfel gives him the ability to go into

more detailed parts of the offense as opposed to the basic points they started with a few years ago.

Zipfel also has three reliable returning pieces in front of him, with offensive linemen Steven Hoffman (WBL honorable mention), Tyler Doden-Kiessling (second-team WBL) and Romeo Valle.

Protection? Check. What about playmakers? That's also taken care of.

Abel Rubio, who took over for an injured Brogan Castillo last year, will patrol the backfield. On the outside is a talented wide receiver group consists of Anothony Wilder, Jordyn Wright, Brady Borton and TJ Kellermyer.

Wilder, a 5-9, 175-pound WBL first-teamer, compiled 1,311 all-purpose yards in 2023 and 14 total touchdowns.

His 4.4 40-yard dash

speed allows him to line up all over the field for Defiance. Just like Zipfel, Wilder has been on the field for his entire high school career.

On the defensive side of the ball, I don't think he can be stopped. He was

Harting has Crestview ready to contend

CONVOY — Last fall, Cole Harting was entering his first season as a head coach.

Crestview was coming off a down year at 4-6, missed the playoffs and lost Carson Hunter, its three-sport athlete and starting quarterback, to graduation.

For Harting, last season was about just trying to stay on top of things in his new role. He had a new system to implement with a new staff around him and a new group of players to become familiar with.

The Knights responded to their new coach by going 7-5, including a 5-1 start, and they won a playoff game 42-14 over second-seeded Tiffin Calvert.

This season, the next step is to sustain that success in a community with high expectations, something that Harting says always comes back to the kids in the program.

"It all comes back to them," he said. "From last year to this year, our kids have worked really hard. We graduated a group that's hard to replace, but these kids are the secret to the success. If they work hard, they'll always give themselves a chance to win."

Crestview lost 13 seniors to graduation, a group that included its top two receivers Beau Eggleston (51 catches, 639 yards, 5 touchdowns) and Kellin Putman (27 catches, 410 yards, 3 touchdowns), its second-leading rusher Jaret Harting (60 carries, 453 yards, 5 touchdowns) and its defensive leader Isaac Kline (80 tackles, 2 sacks, 2 interceptions).

Offensively they're still in good shape, however. with the return of starting quarterback Bryson Penix, running back Braxton Leeth and wide receiver Wren Sheets.

In his first season as the full-time starter, Penix threw for 1,965 yards and 14 touchdowns and ran for 173 yards and four touchdowns.

He constantly tested the secondaries by throwing the ball downfield, something that paid off many times but also resulted in a league-high 13 interceptions.

After one year in the system, Harting believes those numbers will even out.

"My offense has always been centered around the quarterback, so to come in last year and not have any of that experience and play the way he did was phenomenal," Harting said of his senior signal-caller. "After being in the system for a year with an entire offseason to prepare, that experience will be huge for him. Knowing that, I think the turnovers will go way down and the

production is going to go up even higher."

Penix, who was hesitant to play quarterback when Harting was first hired, earned an honorable mention in the Northwest Conference last year.

backer when I got here, and coach (Jake) Harmon (defensive coordinater) has made the comment that he's probably one of the best he's ever had," Harting said. "Now he's fully embraced the role as quarterback, and that's huge. "He's definitely one of the top running backs in the league," coach Harting said. "He's a kid that works so hard on his exact role. He'll come out with his dad to the field and do running back drills in the offseason even when it's snowing out. I don't know if I've ever seen a kid that dedicated to that specific position in all the years I've coached."

Sheets (402 yards, 4 touchdowns) projects to lead a group of wide receivers that also include Isaiah Barton, Hayden Perrott, Liam Putman and Braxtyn Couts, among others.

On the line, Aieden Adams and Ryden Cereghin return, while Denver McDougall, Kale Lichtensteiger, Will Sheets and Kane Roberts are some new names in the mix.

When asked about the

defense, Harting said the Knights return nine starters, and plenty of players will play two-way roles, starting with Sheets, Putman, Adams, Couts and Zayden Martin, who finished second on the team in tackles last season.

He also credited defensive coordinator Jake Harmon for the way he prepares his unit.

"He does a really good job of developing our guys on that side of the ball," Harting said of Harmon. "We return two defensive ends in Liam Putman and Wren Sheets. We need to fill some spots in the interior, but we definitely have some guys that can step up and make those plays.'

The Knights open the season with three straight home games against Parkway, McComb and Wayne Trace. After that, they hit the road to face Fort Loramie, one of two new team in the con-

ference this year along with Lima Central Catholic.

Crestview visits LCC in week 10. The two teams have met in three of the last four years, and the T-Birds are 3-0 in those matchups. This time they'll face off as conference rivals instead of on a playoff collision course.

Adding LCC and Fort Loramie is something Harting sees as a benefit to the Northwest Conference.

"They're two really good programs, and the opportunity to play them just ups the competition for everyone," he said. "Really, there are no weeks off and I'm excited to compete against them."

The Knights play six home games in 2024. They have an important two-game stretch against Bluffton and Columbus Grove, the conference's top two teams last season, in weeks seven and eight.

— Perry coach Seth Evans grinned a bit as he described the Commodores' offense this year.

"It's still spread-ish," the fourth-year head coach said.

The Commodores will be running a double-wing pistol formation, which lines the wide receivers up just behind and outside the tight ends. The quarterback will stay lined up back away from the center, with a running back still in the backfield. It's reminiscent of a wishbone or Wing-T offense, except from the shotgun formation.

"It looks really like a little flex bone," Evans said. "You know, we have a ton of speed. There's a lot of speed there, and Boss is one of the most patient runners that I've ever coached. It looks like he's slowing down, and then he's just waiting for his blocks to set up."

Isaiah McFadden

They're working out the kinks but like what they're seeing, Evans said.

"It's more timing with your motions, and then into your traps, your fakes and your play-actions," Evans said. "That's really the hardest part, getting the timing of the offense just right."

"I know the plays mostly, and I can help the other guys get to where they need to be," Gerten said. "It's a lot easier when you know the playbook."

As much as Pandora-Gilboa misses Morris and Harris on offense, they might be just as missed on defense. Lee and Meyer return to the defensive

backfield. Many players will start on both sides of the ball for the Rockets, who went 8-4 last season. Overall, they have 11 letterwinners back.

"Our biggest concerns are just depth," Hershey said. "It's finding guys when people are cramping up or when fatigue sets in because we are a Division VII school with 35 players. We're going to need more than our first 11."

find some pass rushers on the outside," Hershey said, "somebody who can help out our young secondary and not give the opposing quarterbacks tons of time in the pocket."

Overall, Pandora-Gilboa hopes to remain competitive in the Blanchard Valley Conference. They'll have to get through an emotional start to the season, though, with rivalry games against Columbus Grove, Bluffton and Leipsic in three of the first four weeks of the year.

"We've got a gauntlet right of the gate with our rivals," Hershey said. "As far as the BVC goes, Liberty-Benton won it last year,

and I'd have to say they're the favorite to win it this year. We had them on the ropes last year, and we're hoping maybe this year we can deliver the knockout punch that gets us a championship."

The Rockets are upbeat for 2023, Gerten said, and ready to deliver some surprises.

"It's pretty fun," he said. "We have some upcoming people who will be good. We've got some newer players, so our opponents don't really know who we'll be when we start playing."

Experienced lines a strength for Leipsic

LEIPSIC - Maybe the most notable area of strength for Leipsic this season is having experienced players at almost every position on its offensive line.

That experience runs so deep that when the three leading ball carriers from last season's team (8-3 overall, 5-2 Northwest Conference) graduated, coach Joe Kirkendall moved honorable mention All-Ohio offensive tackle

Quinn Westhoven to the No. 1 running back position this season.

"We lost almost 95 percent of our rushing statistics from last season," Kirkendall said, looking back to last year when Estevan Carrillo and Quin Schroeder, who were fourvear starters, both rushed for more than 600 yards and Trent Siefker gained nearly 500 yards on the

ground. "Quinn Westhoven is the fastest guy on our team or the second-fastest. That will be an interesting transition. Our other running back will be Colin Niese (who started at linebacker last season as a freshman). We'll use those two, rotate them and figure some things out," Kirkendall said.

Leipsic has four returning starters on its offensive line – tackles Lyzaya Berg and Colin Foreman, center Donovan Cunningham and guard Jose Garcia. The defensive line has three returning starters – Westhoven, Berg and Grant David.

"You have to go back to

2010, 2011 to see a team where we had this many guys coming back (on the offensive line). It's a calming thing. It does reduce a lot of anxiety. We ran the ball really, really well last year. We had some limitations throwing but our offense was still pretty effective and it was all through the run game. Those guys coming back is a calming feeling," Kirkendall said.

Freshman Marc Kirkendall will start at quarterback for the Vikings. Jayce Brecht, who had 16

catches a year ago and last season's starting quarterback, Tyler Lammers, will be the Vikings' top wide receivers.

Freshman slot receiver Aaron Hazelton also is expected to be among the top pass catchers.

We have a lot of seniors. We have a lot of length. We have a freshman coming in who is going to start for us from Day 1 at the slot position, kind of a hybrid receiver/running back position. You can hit him with that quick, short

pass or you can run him off tackle. He's going to be well beyond what you'd expect from a freshman playing that position," Kirkendall said.

On defense, Lammers, Tommy Offenbacher and Tavis Bejarano are returning starters in the defensive backfield and Brecht is a returning starter at long snapper.

Leipsic will return to the Blanchard Valley Conference this season after playing in the Northwest Conference for the last three seasons.
